MINUTES

METROPOLITAN AREA EMS AUTHORITY DBA MEDSTAR MOBILE HEALTHCARE BOARD OF DIRECTORS REGULAR MEETING AUGUST 23, 2023

The Metropolitan Area EMS Authority Board of Directors conducted a meeting at the offices of the Authority, with some members participating by video conference call pursuant to Section 551.127(c) of the Texas Government Code. The public was invited to observe the meeting at that location, or by phone or video conference.

I. CALL TO ORDER

Chair Dr. Janice Knebl called the meeting to order at 10:03 a.m.

The motion to approve all items on the Consent Agenda was made by Carlos Flores and seconded by Chris Bolton. The motion carried unanimously.

IV. NEW BUSINESS

BC - 1568 Approval of Compensation and Evaluation Task Force's Recommended Policy for Review of Executive Performance

The motion to approve was made by Teneisha Kennard and seconded by Bryce Davis. The motion carried unanimously.

Teneisha Kennard provided an update to the Board from the Evaluation/Compensation Committee.

V. MONTHLY REPORTS

- **A.** Chief Executive Officer— Ken Simpson referred to Tab A and informed the Board of refund request letters from Blue Cross Blue Shield regarding claims from 2016/17-2022. The Department of Veteran's Affairs is attempting to reduce their payment of ambulance fees, but the industry is pushing back. We are working with the City of Fort Worth, as part of a committee to select a consultant for an EMS Comprehensive Study. The committee will be making a recommending a consultant to the Fort Worth City Council. Mayor Parker has put together an ad hoc committee to work with the consultant. The City Manager's Office has prepared the proposed budget for next fiscal year.
- **B.** Office of the Medical Director Dr. Jeff Jarvis referred to Tab B and informed the Board that OMD's primary foci are protocol development, credentialing, and education. We are currently revising our protocols and just rolled out the new agitation protocol. We are in preparation of our next protocol revision- airway management. We have started three new quality improvements around airway management, cardiac arrest, and STEMI care. Ken Simpson, Fire Chief Davis, and Fire Chief Jacobs are participating in quality management process around cardiac arrest. We have been working with FRAB on a consensus document regarding a baseline of how we do credentialing.
- C. Chief Transformation Officer Matt Zavadsky referred to Tab C and informed the Board of several initiatives which have been completed as part of a continuous effort to receive payment and develop new revenue for services which have not been paid. We have reached an agreement with our third largest payor. We are excited to welcome back our Citizen's Academy starting on September 26th. Medicare will be terminating the ET3 program at the end of the calendar year. Due to low participation in the program, CMS was not able to demonstrate savings in excess of the cost of the significant resources CMS allocated to administer the program.
- **D.** Chief Financial Officer– Steve Post referred and reviewed Tab D with the Board.

- **E.** Chief Human Resources Officer- Leila Peeples referred to Tab E and informed the Board that 11 individuals have completed the Learn and Earn program and are now going through NEOP for credentialing.
- **F.** FRAB Chief Spears informed the Board the FRAB committee held a meeting last month and Chief Spears was reaffirmed as the FRAB representative for the MAEMSA Board of Directors. Ken and Dr. Jarvis did a good job updating the committee on credentialing, protocols, and consultant study.
- **G.** Operations Chris Cunningham referred to Tab G and offered kudos to the Communications Department on meeting the national standards of ring-answer times in the past four months.
- H. Compliance and Legal- Chad Carr referred to Tab H.
- **I.** EPAB Dr. Brad Commons informed the Board, EPAB board met last month and discussed some of the issues surrounding MedStar.



Chief Executive Officer's Report- September 1, 2023

<u>Ad Hoc Staffing</u>: The City of Fort Worth's Ad Hoc EMS committee met for the first time August 29th. They anticipate meeting every two weeks for up to 1-1/2 hours. They requested financial information from MedStar, which we have provided to them. They received updates on the 911 working group, which is discussing dispatch consolidation, and they were provided the last consulting reports done on MedStar from 2008 and 2010 and the Citygate report on Fort Worth Fire's staffing. We will keep the Board updated with the progress of this committee.

<u>Payor Updates</u>: We have been in discussions with Tarrant County's Sherriff's office and JPS Hospital about jail invoices. For many years MedStar has transported patients from the Tarrant County jails and the Fort Worth jail for no charge. We have billed insurance only if they had it and we have been writing off invoices if the patients were financially responsible because we were unable to collect. Tarrant County Sherriff's Office and JPS are scheduling a meeting between the two of them and MedStar to discuss how to handle this moving forward. In total there are about \$2.8 million in outstanding charges to the jails through June 2023.

We are also working with JPS on programs that may improve the care provided to JPS connect patients. This would be beneficial as it offers the opportunity to better address the patient's needs and provides a revenue source for treating these patients without transporting all of them to the hospital.

<u>Blue Cross/Blue Shield</u>: Blue Cross/Blue Shield is further investigating their refund requests and the recoupments that have been made with some of the other providers. MedStar has not seen any further recoupments since the last Board meeting, and we are waiting to find out what Blue Cross/Blue Shield finds with their investigation. Blue Cross/Blue Shield provided notification that they are suspending the generation of any additional refund requests while they investigate.

<u>Veteran's Affairs Fee Schedule Change</u>: The VA held their industry day meeting in late August. They indicated they were prepared to move forward with the new fee schedule, and indicated they don't have any intention to contract with providers offering 911 services to veterans. They expressed concern when it was pointed out that they are creating a shortfall that the veterans may be responsible for paying. The VA stated they would have to do some further work, but they would not commit to delaying or stopping the roll-out of the new fee schedule they have slated for February 16, 2024.

There has been legislation drafted that would allow Congress to prevent the VA from advancing this new fee schedule. This would have to be introduced and approved to serve its intended purpose. The most obvious preference is for the VA to suspend this initiative to collaboratively address this initiative, but we are making preparations for the possibility they continue pushing forward with this rate change.

This would have a \$2.4 million-dollar annual decrease in MedStar's anticipated revenue. A revenue decrease of \$450,000 is built into the budget in anticipation of the change to non-emergency VA rates, but additional adjustment may be needed if the legislative and other avenues are unable to prevent the VA proposal from going into effect in February 2024.

EMS Comprehensive Study: The group tasked with selecting a consultant to conduct this study has narrowed the field to three respondents. They met for presentations on September 7th, and they will be working towards making a recommendation to Fort Worth Mayor and Council in the near future.

STEMI 02: Aspirin Administration for STEMI




The percentage of EMS patients aged 18 years and older transported from the scene with Aspirin administration for suspected heart attack.




The percentage of EMS patients aged 18 years and older transported from the scene with suspected stroke for whom blood glucose was evaluated during the EMS encounter.






Hypoglycemia 01: Treatment Administered for Hypoglycemia

Percentage of EMS responses originating from a 911 request for patients with symptomatic hypoglycemia who received treatment to correct their hypoglycemia.






Percentage of EMS responses originating from a 911 request for patients with primary or secondary impression of respiratory distress who had a respiratory assessment.




Seizure 02: Patients with Status Epilepticus Receiving Intervention

NEMSQA Stroke 01:Suspected Stroke Patient Receiving Prehospital Stroke Assessment




Percentage of EMS responses originating from a 911 request for patients suffering from a suspected stroke who had a stroke assessment performed during the EMS response.

The following summarizes significant items in the August 31, 2023, Financial Reports:

Statement of Revenues and Expenses:

Month to Date: Net Income for the month of August 2023 is a gain of \$1,127,373 as compared to a budgeted gain of \$68,093 for a positive variance of \$1,059,279. EBITDA for the month of August 2023 is a gain of \$1,653,676 compared to a budgeted gain of \$450,768 for a positive variance of \$1,202,907.

- Patient Contact volume in August ended the month 109% to budget.
- Net Revenue in August is \$1,238K over budget or 124% to budget. The overage is made up of \$798,966.83 in Grant dollars received in August and \$439,464.70 in revenue over budget.
- Total Expenses ended the month 103.5% to budget or \$179K over budget. In August, MedStar incurred additional expenses in Salaries and Overtime of \$62K, Vehicle & Equipment Maintenance of \$33K, Facility and Equip. Maintenance Of \$30K, Misc Exp. of \$80K and Depreciation and Amortization of \$127K. The total of all other line-item expense is below budget by (\$154K).

Year to Date: EBITDA is \$5,265,566 as compared to a budget of \$3,307,434 for a positive variance of \$1,958K.

• The main drivers for this variance are YTD patient encounters are 106% to budget and YTD net revenue is 108% to budget equating to a YTD positive variance to budget for Net Revenue of \$4,172,713. Year to date expense is 104% to budget or \$2,313,949 over budget. The main driver for the overage in expense is the following line items are over budget: Salaries and OT is above budget by \$950K, Benefits and Taxes is above budget by \$558K and Misc. Expense is above budget by \$883K. The Misc. Expense is driven by the Ransom attach year to date cost of \$857K. The total of all other expense lines is below budget by a total of (\$79K) for the year.

Key Financial Indicators:

- Current Ratio MedStar has \$9.39 in current assets (Cash, receivables) for every dollar in current debt. (Goal: a score of \$1.00 would mean sufficient current assets to pay debts.)
- Cash Reserves The Restated Interlocal Cooperative Agreement mandates 3 months of operating capital. As of August 31, 2022, there is 4.4 months of operating capital.
- Accounts Receivable Turnover This statistic indicates MedStar's effectiveness in extending
 credit and collecting debts by indicating the average age of the receivables. MedStar's goal is a
 ratio greater than 3.0 times; current turnover is 7.3 times.
- Return on Net Assets This ratio determines whether the agency is financially better off than in previous years by measuring total economic return. An improving trend indicates increasing net assets and the ability to set aside financial resources to strengthen future flexibility. Through March, the return is 1.66%.

MAEMSA/EPAB cash reserve balance as of August 31, 2023, is \$475,470.69.
